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









Five on a Treasure Island. An Adventure Story for Boys and Girls

The first Famous Five book, and the dustwrapper on this third impression is identical to that on the first impression, issued a mere two months earlier. \$2500





We painted these to show the way we do it' (text on the outside rear cover surrounding a full-colour strip of illustrations). Printed on the inside front cover is 'Bib's Advice' on 'How to put on Paint'; Bub's tips on 'How not to paint' appear on the inside rear cover. \$1250





A bright and desirable example of the scarce deluxe issue of the edition (and undoubtedly rare in this condition). **\$10,000**







6 [YONGE, Charlotte Mary]:

The Heir of Redclyffe

London, John W. Parker and Son, 1854 (fifth edition)/ 1853.

An extensively extra-illustrated association copy of one of the best-selling romances of the nineteenth century. It was presented by the Reverend George Moberly (who is thought to have inspired some of the characters in the novel) to his daughter Mary Louisa in 1854. The illustrations include twelve original watercolours and eight pencil drawings. \$750

7 GRAVES, Robert:

Poems 1926-1930

London, William Heinemann Ltd, 1931.

With corrections and alterations to the text in the author's hand on 30 pages.


Provenance: Margaret Russell (née Reed), nanny to Jenny, the first child of Robert Graves and Nancy Nicholson, then lifelong friend of Robert Graves; by descent. \$2000

John Betjeman's Collected Poems. Compiled and with an Introduction by The Earl of Birkenhead

London, John Murray, 1958 [first edition].

In a contemporary deluxe binding by Sangorski & Sutcliffe, and with a personalised Christmas card inscribed and signed by the author: 'Hooray Hooray for | Middlesex, London's | County, London's Elysium, | Keats's inspiration & to | Hell with the L.C.C. & up | with Mill Hill | Happy Christmas | [from] John Betjeman'. \$1100



10 WOOLF, Virginia:

Orlando. A Biography

New York, Crosby Gaige, 1928 (first edition).

Number 286 of 800 copies signed by Virginia Woolf.

This American limited edition is the true first edition; it was published on 2 October 1928, preceding the Hogarth Press edition by some nine days. Provenance: Edward Joseph Harrington O'Brien (1890-1941), American writer, poet, editor and anthologist; by descent. **\$12,500**



11 BOETHIUS, Anicius Manlius Severinus:

Boetius de Consolatione [Philosophiae] & De Disciplina Scholarium

Impressis venetiis [Venice], per Joanne de Forlivio & Gregoriü fratres [Giovanni and Gregorio de Gregori de Forlivio], 10 February 1497 (first thus).

Small folio, in an early binding of blind-tooled quarter leather over wooden boards (sensitively rebacked).

An early incunable edition of Boethius' *De consolatione philosophiae* (On the Consolation of Philosophy), together with the *De disciplina scholarium* of Pseudo-Boethius, and with commentary by Pseudo-Thomas Aquinas.

Boethius wrote this classic while imprisoned by Theodoric the Great in 523, awaiting execution for treason. Its continued popularity throughout the Middle Ages proved an important link between classical learning and mediaeval Christian thought. \$7500




12 CICERO, Marcus Tullius:

Pro L. Cornelio Balbo M. Tullii Ciceronis Oratio, cum F. Sylvii Ambiani Commentariis luculentissimis

[Paris], Vænundatur Iodoco Badio Ascesio ... [Sub prelo Ascensiano], 1535/1531.


Cicero's oration For Cornelius Balbus in an early edition, the second to be printed by the influential Parisian printer and scholar Jodocus Badius (Josse Bade), with the woodcut device of his Ascensius Press (Prelum Ascensianum), showing a busy Renaissance printing workshop. Provenance: C.R. and J.E. Ashbee (of the Essex House Press). \$1100



13 [LINDSAY, Norman] EMERSON, E.S.:

An Australian Bird Calendar Melbourne, George Robertson and Company Pty. Ltd., [1909].

This calendar, with charming illustrations of Australian birds by Norman Lindsay, first appeared in the Lone Hand magazine. \$750



14 **JONES**, Owen:

The Grammar of Ornament. Illustrated by Examples from Various Styles of Ornament London, Bernard Quaritch, 1868 [third edition]/1856.

Lavishly illustrated with 112 full-page chromolithographs. **\$1250**



5 [Revolutionary Binding]. FREILIGRATH, Ferdinand:

Gedichte. [Bound with] Neuere Politische und Soziale Gedichte. Erstes Heft

Stuttgart, J.G. Cotta'scher Verlag, 1848 (tenth edition), and Köln, 'Selbstverlag des Verfassers', 1849 (second impression).

A striking contemporary binding reflecting Freiligrath's radical liberal politics, and containing his revolutionary anthems relating to the German revolutions of 1848.

The spine features a red flag (highlighting the letters FREI in the author's name), and the edges are coloured after the new tricolour flag of Germany, elegised in his poem 'Schwarz-Roth-Gold', which contains the refrain 'Hurrah, du Schwarz, du Roth, du Gold! Pulver ist schwarz, Blut ist roth, Golden flackert die Flamme!' \$1500




16 MILL, John Stuart:

Utilitarianism

London, Parker, Son, and Bourn, 1863.

Mill's definitive statement on moral philosophy. The text was first published as a series of three articles in *Fraser's Magazine* in 1861; this first edition in book form is rare.

This work refines earlier conceptions of utilitarianism, in particular by distinguishing between 'higher' and 'lower' pleasures. This distinction is memorably summed up: 'It is better to be a human being dissatisfied than a pig satisfied; better to be Socrates dissatisfied than a fool satisfied. And if the fool, or the pig, are of a different opinion, it is because they only know their own side of the question'. \$9500



17 [Eugenics]. PEARSON, Karl:

An autograph letter signed by English biostatistician and mathematician Karl Pearson (1857-1936) to an acquaintance, discussing the subject of telegony

Duodecimo, 4 pages on conjugate leaves, Hampstead, 29 March 1899.

Telegony is a discredited theory that offspring can inherit characteristics from a genetically-unrelated previous sexual partner of their mother. While Pearson disclaims a belief in telegony – based on his study of the children of black women who had previously borne children to white men – he was nevertheless a proponent of other pseudoscientific ideas on race and heredity, in particular social Darwinism and eugenics. Pearson's major lasting scientific contributions are to the disciplines of mathematical statistics, biometrics, and meteorology. **\$2000**



18 BROWN, Robert:

Prodromus Floræ Novæ Hollandiæ et Insulæ Van-Diemen, exhibens Characteres Plantarum quas annis 1802-1805 per oras utriusque insulae collegit et descripsit Robertus Brown ...

Londini [London], Typis Richardi Taylor et socii, 1810.

Brown was the naturalist on Matthew Flinders' Investigator voyage (1801-3), and remained in Australia to continue his botanical work until 1805. This rare and important book is the product. In 1859 Sir Joseph Dalton Hooker would write that Brown's Prodromus 'has for half a century maintained its reputation unimpugned, as the greatest botanical work that has ever appeared'. Only 250 copies of this first edition were printed, and it is said that only twenty-six copies sold, after which Brown personally assumed control of the distribution. \$3000



19 BROWN, Robert:

Supplementus Primum Prodromi Florae Novae Hollandiae

Londini [London], Typis Ricardi Taylor [Richard Taylor], 1830.

A presention copy, inscribed 'For Monsr. Desfontaines, from the Author'. The recipient is undoubtedly René Louiche Desfontaines (1750-1833), botanist and director of the Muséum National d'Histoire Naturelle in Paris. Later provenance from geographer and botanist Prince Roland Napoléon Bonaparte (1858-1924), and the Faculté de sciences de Lyon, which received his herbarium. \$5000




20 BROWN, Robert:

The Miscellaneous Botanical Works of Robert Brown ... Vol. III. Atlas of Plates

London, Published for the Ray Society by Robert Hardwicke, 1868.

The first ten plates, by Ferdinand Bauer, were first issued in the appendix to Matthew Flinders' A Voyage to Terra Australis (1814) and are printed here from the original copper plates. Rare in the original cloth-backed plain boards. \$2000





The Origin of Species by Means of Natural Selection, or the Preservation of Favoured Races in the Struggle for Life London, John Murray, 1875 ('Sixth edition, with additions and corrections | (Fifteenth Thousand)').

The sixth edition was the first to use the term 'evolution', and to drop the word 'On' from the title. This copy is from a later printing, before Darwin's final changes were introduced in the 'Eighteenth Thousand' (1876). \$1500




22 DARWIN, Charles:

On the Various Contrivances by which British and Foreign Orchids are fertilised by Insects, and on the Good Effects of Intercrossing

London, John Murray, 1862 (first edition).

The scarce first issue of Darwin's first major work after *On the Origin of Species* (1859). Its exploration of the mechanisms of pollination offered a persuasive, observable demonstration of his theory of natural selection in operation, in particular through the coevolution of insects and the sexual structures of the orchids that they fertilise. With the contemporary blindstamp of the Adelaide bookseller W.C. Rigby, and the early stamps of the Gawler Institute, attesting to the early importation of Darwin's works into colonial South Australia. **\$5000**




23 DARWIN, Charles:

The Formation of Vegetable Mould, through the Action of Worms, with Observations on their Habits

London, John Murray, 1881 (fourth thousand)/1881.

Darwin died on 19 April 1882, soon after the publication of this edition. Provenance: Dr Kenneth Ernest Lee (1927-2007), distinguished NZ-born Australian soil scientist. **\$750**





24 [DARWIN, Charles] HOOKER, Joseph Dalton:

On the Flora of Australia, its Origin, Affinities, and Distribution; being an Introductory Essay to the Flora of Tasmania ...

London, Lovell Reeve, [November] 1859.

The rare first separate edition of the first significant work to support Darwin's theory of evolution by natural selection.

In the concluding paragraph of the postscript, unique to this edition, Hooker writes: 'I would further observe here, to avoid ambiguity, that my friend Mr. Darwin's just completed work *On the Origin of Species by Natural Selection* [sic], from the perusal of much of which in MS. I have profited so largely, had not appeared during the printing of the Essay, or I should have largely quoted it. Kew, November, 4, 1859'. **\$18,000**

25 **CURTIS, Samuel and William Jackson HOOKER:**

Curtis's Botanical Magazine; or, Flower-Garden displayed ... Vol. I. of the New Series; or Vol. LIV of the Whole Work. [Together with] ... Vol. II. of the New Series; or Vol. LV of the Whole Work

London, Printed by Edward Couchman for the Proprietor, Samuel Curtis, 1827 and 1828.

The first two volumes of the 'New Series', instituted by the magazine's new editor William Jackson Hooker, who in these early years contributed the botanical descriptions as well as most of the drawings from which the plates were engraved. These volumes contain 171 hand-coloured plates (many folding), illustrating species from around the world, including Australia and the Pacific, the Americas, Africa and Asia, as well as decorative European plants. \$2000



26 MUELLER, Baron Ferdinand von:

Eucalyptographia. A Descriptive Atlas of the Eucalypts of Australia and the Adjoining Islands

Melbourne, John Ferres, Government Printer (and others), 1879 to 1884.

Large quarto, ten fascicles, each containing a separate title leaf and 11 full-page lithographic plates.

A presentation set, inscribed by Mueller 'To the Honorable David Wilkie, M.D., a generous and enlightened supporter of the author's researches'. David Elliot Wilkie (1815-1885), Scottish-born physician, was a sometime collaborator of Mueller's, and treasurer of the Exploration Committee which sponsored the Burke and Wills expedition. **\$4000**






27 BAILEY, Frederick M.:

Handbook to the Ferns of Queensland, compiled from the Most Recent Works on Ferns; and an Introduction to Fern Study

Brisbane, Thorne and Greenwell, 1874.

An impressive association copy of the author's first separate publication, notwithstanding one missing leaf. The front free endpaper is inscribed to 'Prof Tate with J.E.T.W's compts. The ms alterations are by the author. Sydney June 6. 1879'.

The donor is Julian Edmund Tenison-Woods (1832-1889), Catholic priest, educationist and scientist, and the alterations referred to include a full-page list of ten 'Queensland Ferns to be added'. \$1250





28 RUSSELL, Henry Chamberlain:

A collection of proof copies of 311 weather maps for the eastern half of Australia, prepared for publication in Australian newspapers from 1 January to 31 December 1878.

[Sydney, Government Printer?], 1878.

Henry Chamberlain Russell (1836-1907) was appointed NSW Government Astronomer in 1870, and from 1877 released a daily weather map based on data exchanged by telegraph and a system of forecasting developed with Robert Lewis Ellery and Charles Todd. \$2200

29 RICHARDSON, William:

A Catalogue of 7385 Stars, chiefly in the Southern Hemisphere, prepared from Observations made in the years 1822, 1823, 1824, 1825, and 1826 ...

London, His Majesty's Stationery Office, printed by order of the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, 1835.

The first detailed star catalogue of the Australian sky, sometimes referred to as the 'Brisbane Catalogue' after Sir Thomas Makdougall Brisbane, Governor of New South Wales from 1821 to 1825, who established the Parramatta observatory.

Provenance: Sir George Henry Scott Douglas, 4th Baronet, a relation and fellow officer of Sir Thomas Brisbane, who named his son George Brisbane Scott Douglas (author and poet, later 5th Baronet) after either Sir Thomas or his son Thomas Australius Brisbane. **\$1500**





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30 De La GUÉRINIÈRE, François Robichon:

Ecole de Cavalerie contenant la Connoissance, l'Instruction, et la Conservation du Cheval

Paris, Jacques Collombat, 1733 [first folio edition]/ 1731.

A foundational work on horsemanship, and one of the most beautiful illustrated equestrian books. De La Guérinière was Equerry to Louis XIV, and this influential treatise encompasses all aspects of equestrianism, from dressage to cavalry manoeuvres to veterinary science. \$3000

31 **BECK, Salim:**

The Mongolian Horse ... Translated from the Russian

'Tientsin, N.-China' [Tianjin], Société Française de Librairie et d'Edition, 1926.

A scarce work on the Mongolian horse (or China pony) intended for European expatriates in China, with a focus on racing. The author was a veterinary surgeon in the employ of Russian stud owners on the Mongolian steppe. \$750

32 BOUCAUT, The Honorable Sir lames Penn:

The Arab. The Horse of the Future. Preface by Sir Walter Gilbey ...

London, Gay and Bird, 1905.

A presentation copy inscribed by the author to Adelaide solicitor Charles a'Court Bloxam (1869-1911). Sir James Penn Boucaut (1831-1916), besides being an Arab horse breeder, was also a Supreme Court Judge and three-times Premier of South Australia. \$750
























33 **HAMILTON**, George:

Treatment of the Horse in Australia by Geo Hamilton 1864 [Adelaide, the Author], 1864.

A complete suite of 11 photographs (vintage albumen prints, approximately 88 × 134 mm, after pen and ink drawings), captioned neatly in ink by the artist. The rare 1864 published version of Hamilton's searing indictment of the widespread ill-treatment of horses was perhaps the earliest Australian book illustrated with photographs. The present offering (apparently unique) clearly predates the published use of these images, and its presentation is much to be preferred, due to the superior size and quality of the prints, and the captions. Complete with its narrative continuity, it is the archetypal photobook ... \$15,000



34 [Shaggy Ridge]. GREEN, Private William Ellis:

Panoramic View from Prothero 2. Ref: 1'25000 Series

[In the Field, New Guinea, early 1944].

A very large and impressive original watercolour (700×3235 mm) of part of the Finisterre Range in north-east New Guinea, where Australian forces secured a crucial victory against Japanese forces between December 1943 and February 1944. The Battle of Shaggy Ridge saw the Australian 7^{th} Division attack well-fortified Japanese positions up precipitous slopes and through inhospitable jungle. This superb panorama, painted in the field, shows the mountainous terrain and the rocky outcrops that saw the worst of the fighting (and the best of Diggers' humour in their nomenclature).



William Ellis Green OAM (1923-2008), the artist, was attached to the 15th Brigade Army Intelligence unit in the Markham and Ramu Valleys during the Battle of Shaggy Ridge. He is better known to later generations of Australians as the cartoonist WEG.

Provenance: Major-General George Alan Vasey (1895-1945), commander of the 7th Division during the Finisterre Range campaign. Shortly before being evacuated sick from New Guinea in February 1944, he was presented with this painting, inscribed at the bottom left 'With the Compliments of | HQ - 15 Aust. Inf. Bde. AIF. || Int. Section | W.E. Green Pte'. It subsequently entered the Ray Hellier collection, which was offered for sale after his death by Kay Craddock Antiquarian Bookseller in August 2008 (see item 449). Thereafter, it entered a private collection, Melbourne. **\$20,000**

'Sun' Foundry. Illustrated Catalogue. Second Edition. Vol. II. Architectural, Sanitary, and General Castings, and Wrought Ironwork. A.C. Harley & Co., General Ironfounders and Blacksmiths Adelaide, A.C. Harley & Co., 1914.

A rare, attractive and important catalogue of decorative ironwork - and in superb condition to boot. The very rare first edition appeared in 1897, and is in fact Volume I. **\$2000**

The Aniline Colours of the Badische Anilin-& Soda-Fabrik, Ludwigshafen °/Rhine, and their Application on Wool, Cotton, Silk and other Textile Fibres

[Ludwigshafen am Rhein, Badische Anilin- & Soda-Fabrik], 1901.


A comprehensive manual to the aniline dyes produced by the Badische Anilin- & Soda-Fabrik, with 20 'Pattern Sheets' with over 620 captioned mounted samples of dyed fabrics and threads. Founded in 1865, the Badische Anilin- & Soda-Fabrik was a pioneer manufacturer of synthetic dyes. Still based in Ludwigshafen, and now trading as BASF, it is currently the largest chemical producer in the world. **\$1250**

77 Cotton Industry. [PRESCOTT, Joseph Arthur]:


A manuscript compendium relating to the cotton industry of the late nineteenth century, compiled by a Lancashire machine fitter specialising in cotton processing [Lancashire, Unpublished], 1886.

The carefully-written notes, with numerous diagrams, cover the growing and processing of cotton, in particular the types and configurations of machines for ginning, carding, spinning, and weaving cotton.

The compiler worked in Italy, Alsace and northern France, and was the father of South Australian soil scientist and climatologist James Arthur Prescott CBE. \$750







38 DUMAS, Alexandre:

Petit Dictionnaire de Cuisine Paris, Alphonse Lemerre, 1882.

The author of *The Three Musketeers* and *The Count of Monte Cristo* was a famous gourmand, whose *Grand Dictionnaire de Cuisine* was published posthumously in 1873. This is a condensed edition containing mainly recipes, without the anecdotes that characterise the *Grand Dictionnaire*. **\$550**

39 BRILLAT-SAVARIN, Jean Anthelme:

Physiologie du Goût, ou Méditations de Gastronomie Transcendante

Paris, Just Tessier, Libraire, 1838 (fifth edition)/1826.


An early edition of the principal work by the father of gastronomic writing, offered with an autograph legal document signed at the head of the first page by Jean Anthelme Brillat-Savarin (1755-1826) in his capacity as magistrate of the Court of Cassation. **\$2500**

40 'Bacchus' and 'Cordon Bleu':

New Guide for the Hotel, Bar, Restaurant, Butler, and Chef. Being a Hand Book for the Management of Hotel and American Bars, and the Manufacture of the Principal New and Fashionable Drinks. Hotel & Restaurant Cookery, as now practised, with the Newest Entrees and Dishes...

London, William Nicholson and Sons, [1885].

'Cordon Bleu' is apparently the pseudonym of Emilie Lebour-Fawssett, author of *French Cooking* for Ladies. **\$2000**





41 WHITRIDGE, W.O. (compiler):

The South Australian Cricketers' Guide. Season 1876-77

Adelaide, E.S. Wigg & Son, 1877.

'First Year of Publication', offered together with the second volume, The South Australian Cricketers' Guide and Footballers' Companion. Season 1877-78 (1878).

A third volume was produced for the 1884-85 season, after which publication ceased. **\$7000**




42 [HOBSON, William Colling] WALKER, John and Charles:

Hobson's Fox-Hunting Atlas; containing Separate Maps of Every County in England ...

London, J. and C. Walker, [circa 1850s].

The 42 double-page maps are colour lithographic reproductions of the county maps in John and Charles Walker's *British Atlas* (1837), with the borders of the hunts delineated by a dashed line and hand-colouring. **\$2000**





43 BARTHOLOMEW, John:

Bartholomew's Library Chart of the World on Mercator's Projection London, George Philip & Son, [late 1870s].

An extremely large full-colour map $(1420 \times 1880 \text{ mm})$ in eight sheets, each comprising two panels mounted as a pair on linen, with its respective portion of the key map mounted on the verso.











This copy has in addition a large albumen silver photograph of "Tweedie Hall" Natal | Taken by the architect [William Street-Wilson] while the house was being built in 1892'. The house was built by James and Eliza Morton, and is still owned by their descendants. \$4500

A stereo daguerreotype (85×170 mm) of the Exposition Universelle in Paris in 1855, the first International Exhibition held in France

The daguerreotype was the first commercially successful photographic process (1839-1860) in the history of photography. André Disderi (1819-1889) obtained the rights to photograph the products and artworks at the Exposition as a distinguished daguerreotypist, but his lasting fame is that he took out the first patent for the carte de visite in 1854. Ironically, this inexpensive massproduced paper photograph hastened the demise of these beautiful precursors. \$5000

55 A hand-coloured half-plate ambrotype of an Australian rural scene, featuring several crude bush dwellings with animal pens in the background and two men standing in the foreground, surrounded by archetypal eucalyptus-dominated scrub.

Plate size 105×140 mm, mounted as issued behind an ornate oval gilt metal matt (visible image size 90×120 mm), in a velvet-lined leather-covered case.

The precise photographer, subjects, location and date are unknown, but the ambrotype came and went in the period 1855-1865. Large-format Australian outdoor ambrotypes are scarce; ones of this quality are rare. \$25,000

A manuscript journal kept by an English emigrant to the Australian and Californian goldfields, most likely one Henry Robinson, between December 1848 and December 1852.

The journal begins with Robinson's voyage and accounts of time on shore in Adelaide and Hobart Town. Disappointed by his prospects in Australia, he sails for California via Tahiti and Hawaii. He does not record his American adventures, but they cannot have been successful, as he is soon back in Australia, setting out from Melbourne towards the goldfields, via Keilor and Bacchus Marsh, around October 1851. His account of this period is of strong parochial interest. \$9500




